

Summer Swimmers

It's summertime and here in Alaska, we love getting outside and exploring everything the great outdoors has to offer! For many, this includes swimming in the lakes, river, and ocean. At Paws for Purple Hearts, we want to teach our dogs to be comfortable with any lifestyle that their Warrior might have an interest in; this includes water activities. In case you didn't know, the dogs at PPH are a combination of Labrador Retrievers, Golden Retrievers or a mix of the two. A lot of people assume that these breeds take to water immediately, but that's not always the case. It was finally time for two of our pups, Elaine and Kreitzburg a.k.a. "Laney and Kai", to put on their life jackets and hit the pool. In Alaska, we take our pups to an indoor dog pool called Alaska K9 Aquatics. It's perfect for dogs who like to swim year-round but live in a place that's covered in snow and ice for a good portion of the year. This is a great environment for Laney and Kai to be comfortably introduced to the water. The instructors at the pool spend the entire first session with each dog playing and slowly introducing them into the water by using either toys or food as motivation.

Kai was a little apprehensive at first but really loved playing with the different toys the instructor had. He was eventually taken for a little float by the instructors and seemed to be enjoying himself quite a bit. For some people,

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giving your dog swim lessons may seem unnecessary. But this is just another important piece of training that our Service Dogs go through and it's something that you can have your own dog participate in too. Being fearful of water can be a really hard thing for any dog to overcome, so you want to make sure they're first experiences with it are positive ones. If not introduced correctly, the dog might develop a fear of the water, making swimming or even bath time a scary activity, so if you want to teach your dog to swim and safely cool off in the summer heat, then be sure to look for a swim class for your dog that's closest to you! That's why at PPH, our trainers take the time to introduce our dogs to all new things in a safe and fun environment!

PAWS Act: Groundbreaking Opportunity

Many of our readers know Paws for Purple Hearts is dedicated to Veterans and our programs are exclusively offered to them, but this year we are taking it one step further from participating in the PAWS Act. You are probably curious as to what the PAWS Act is all about and what it entails? Well we are here to break it down and give you all a glimpse into the science behind our Service Dog Programs! The PAWS Act was brought about by a new bill enacted by Congress and signed by the President of the United States. It had previously been presented to Congress back in 2016 and has gone through many reconstructive changes over the last six years. It is now called "Puppies Assisting Wounded Service members" (PAWS) for Veterans Therapy Act. This act requires the Veterans Affairs Administrations to implement a five-year program that offers Veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder the opportunity to train with Service Dogs as a portion of their complementary health program. This allows eligible Veterans

registered through the VA health care system that have been recommended by a professional mental health care official to participate in the therapy offered through programs such as ours. Of the five sites authorized, two of our PPH sites out of the five were selected: PPH Alaska and PPH San Antonio! PPH agreed to participate in this five year volunteer program to help prove just how life changing these dogs are to our Veterans and why it is important to continue to promote the Service Dog Industry. Within this five year training program through the VA, our two facilities are proving to the world and our government that Service Dogs do make a difference in the lives of wounded Warriors which has been our mission from the very start. Paws for Purple Hearts and the other organizations within this PAWS Act are here to show through various studies and research over the course of these five years just how much it matters. We cannot wait to share with you more on this phenomenal opportunity and the impact that it will make. Since we are receiving no funding from the government for providing this program to Veterans, we are more grateful than ever for contributions to our organization from donors like you!
