PAWS Act Developments

The PAWS Act was signed into law back on August 25th, 2021 and it requires the VA to conduct a five-year pilot program to provide canine training to Veterans that have been diagnosed with PTSD as a part of their mental health care. It was not only passed by congress, but signed by the President as well to conduct this extremely important research. As we mentioned in our last newsletter, the PPH Alaska site was selected as one of five Service Dog organizations to participate in the "Puppies Assisting Wounded Servicemembers" (PAWS) for Veterans Therapy Act pilot program. The hope is that this program will prove the benefits that Psychiatric Assistance Dogs have on Service Members suffering from the daily struggles of PTSD.



We are so excited to tell you all about the PAWS Act and how things are progressing up here in Alaska. By the time this newsletter goes to print, we will have started our fifth "cohort" or group. Several of the participants have come back to PPH after their eight-week cohort to sign up as a volunteer or as a Puppy Parent. The feedback has been extremely positive thus far that we have started holding a second weekly session so that we can have as many Veterans come through our cohorts as possible. The addition of the two new puppies has made these cohorts even more exciting because the participants are able to see the different levels of learning and tasking from a five-month-old puppy up to a dog that has been training for a year and a half. We are continuously grateful for the opportunity to participate in this nationwide pilot program that partners with Veterans Affairs.
